EXHIBITION HALL ENTRY LOCATIONS, DATES & TIMES

Entry forms must be dropped in the box at the Quairading CRC or emailed to quairadingagshow@outlook.com by Monday 3rd October 2022.

Junior Section entry forms can be emailed to: jarmanderson@skymesh.com.au

All Exhibition Hall entries (except Photography Section) must then be dropped off at the Exhibition Hall at the showgrounds the morning of Friday 7th October 2022 between 8.00am – 10.00am.

From 10.30am only stewards, assistants and judges will be permitted in the Exhibition Hall and doors will be locked for uninterrupted judging.

Photography Section entries to be delivered to the Quairading CRC before 4.30pm on Wednesday 5th October. Please ensure your photo has NAME and CLASS noted on the back of it.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- All entries received are subject to such regulations and by-laws to conform to the uniform by-laws made under the Royal Agricultural Society Act 1926
- All articles MUST be the work of the exhibitor (except My Collection Section).
- Any article having won a prize at a previous Quairading Ag Show is not eligible for entry
- No residency limit on entries
- Should there be a tie in any section in which points are awarded for trophies, the exhibitor gaining the greatest number of firsts shall be declared the winner.
- To win a trophy, an exhibitor must gain at least 5 points and exhibit in more than one class.
- Exhibitors are requested to co-operate with Stewards in the performance of their duties.
- No person other than judges and officials will be allowed in the exhibition hall while judging is in progress
- The Committee will take every care of exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss by accident, fire, or other means, either in transit, in the building or during exhibitions.
- Late entries will only be accepted at the discretion of the steward.
- No exhibits are to be removed from the Exhibition Hall before 4.30pm on Show Day.

- Sheep to be penned by 10:00am Saturday 8th October.
- Sheep will be penned in breeding groups to preserve Brucellosis status of breeders.
- Judging Time: Between 11.30am and 12pm Saturday 8th October.
- Exhibitors are requested to leave stock on exhibition until 3:00pm.

Identification and waybill requirements:

- All owners of sheep must have a valid PIC for where their stock is kept.
- All sheep must be tagged with an NLIS tag that reflects the year of birth and that bears the brand (or PIC) of the breeder [in right ear of females or in left ear of males].
- Any sheep that are not living on property of birth/owned by breeder, must be tagged with an additional NLIS tag that is pink and bears the brand (or PIC) of the current owner [in the left ear of females (female earmark ear) or in right ear of males (male earmark ear)]
- All sheep leaving the property must travel with a complete waybill.
 - * It is acceptable to use the one waybill that reads "destination to Quairading Showground and return" so that only one waybill is needed.
 - * Provide the original waybill to the event manager / livestock steward.

The Quairading Agricultural Society is aware of the current Foot and Mouth Disease situation and will advise of any changes to this Section.

SECTION J: CAKE DECORATING

Category Rules:

Additional requirements and restrictions are stated in each class.

1. Base / presentation board must be fitted with cleats sufficient to allow ease of handling. Cleats are feet which are attached to the board to raise it off the surface.
2. The completed exhibit including any drape used in presentation must fit within the perimeter of the specified board size stated in each class.
3. A tiered cake where each level is not stacked one above the other must be linked on a common board.
4. Novelty Cakes: The majority of the exhibit must be cake, supported by icing techniques. Model shaped tins must not be used.
5. Blocks or polystyrene may be used to simulate cakes unless otherwise stated but must be achievable in cake.
6. All cakes are to be covered in R.T.R (ready to roll), unless otherwise stated.
7. Exhibitor label to be attached to the front left of exhibit.

PERMITTED ARE:

1. A minimal amount of florists' wire, florist tape, stamens, corn silk, cotton net and thread, tulle and lustre dust.
2. Edible food grade metallic colour will be allowed provided the name of the product used is included on the "Information Card".
3. Ribbon, braid and cord may be used to compliment or highlight cake decorating techniques but should not be used as the main feature or focus of the exhibit.
4. Paper, fabric, lace, ribbon, braid, cord, lustre/shimmer powder, cake decorating glitter and non-toxic commercial glue may be used on board presentation.
5. Thick glass and mirror may be used as base/presentation boards.
6. Wooden or Perspex skewers and food approved cake support systems are permitted for support in tiered and Novelty/Sculptured cakes and sugar art.
7. Covered boards and hard food safe barriers may be used to support decorations.
8. Manufactured pillars may be used to support tiered cakes, plaques, and floral arrangement.
9. A commercial posy pick may be used if the top edge is visible above the covering of the cake and is declared on the "Information Card".
10. "Safety Seal" may be used but must have the top edge visible and be declared on the "Information Card".
11. Foam flower centres may be used but must be declared on the "Information Card".

NOT PERMITTED ARE:

1. Pins of any description.
2. Wire must not penetrate the covering of the cake.
3. Manufactured ornaments and decorations.
4. Glass of any description, except as base/presentation board.
5. Plant stems and foliage.
6. Mechanical aids and any other manufactured material, unless otherwise stated.
7. Wafer Paper and gelatin are not to be used as a main feature, unless otherwise stated.

More than 2500 years ago Egyptians put scarecrows in their fields to protect wheat crops from hungry quail. This year we are putting scarecrows on the showgrounds to keep an eye on all the fun we'll be having! Be sure to name your scarecrow with a name tag attached.

- Pre-moulded or commercially available face masks ARE NOT permitted.
- Scarecrows must be in good taste and not reflect controversial/social or political situations.
- Scarecrows need to be self-supporting and must have a strong support base.
- Exhibit must be a minimum of 1metre high and maximum of 2 metres
- Limited to ONE entry per Exhibitor
- Be sure to name your scarecrow with a name tag attached

All exhibits must be in clear, colourless, unbranded jars with screw lids, labelled and dated. Please ensure the inside of the lid is clean.

NO MATERIAL ON LIDS. Jam jars should be filled to just below the top of the jar/bottle.

EGGS Must be clean, not washed, **in half cartons**. To be judged on size, shape, and yolk colour.

12. One jar marmalade, orange or mixed
13. One jar grapefruit marmalade
